## **Robert Rowe to Speak on “New Hampshire and the War for Independence”**

The Mont Vernon Historical Society and the Friends of the Daland Memorial Library will co-sponsor a talk, “New Hampshire and the War for Independence”, focusing on events that took place in New Hampshire before and during the American Revolutionary War. Some of these unique and important events are not well known beyond the borders of NH.

The speaker, Robert Rowe, has lived in NH, including Mont Vernon, for 38 years. He's a retired attorney and currently an elected member of the NH House of Representatives. Publications include four books, three non-fiction, one historical novel, about New Hampshire during the Colonial and Federal periods. He currently resides in Amherst in Jones Tavern, the first tavern in Amherst Village and site of inquisitions of suspected Tory sympathizers.

The program will be held on Thursday, April 9; at 7:30 p.m. in the meeting room in the Town Hall on Main Street in Mont Vernon. All are welcome. No charge. Refreshments will be served. ## BBB Warning: Don't Fall for Mystery Shopping Scam!

The Better Business Bureau is warning consumers that thieves are using the name of a legitimate mystery shopping company to scam people across the country.

The owner of Measure Consumer Perspectives, Kimberly Nasief, has received calls from consumers all over the U.S. who say they received a hefty check from her company along with a letter stating they have been chosen for two mystery shopping assignments. The letter looks legitimate with the company's logo and a reference to the company being a BBB Accredited Business.

So far, the BBB has received one local complaint related to this scam, but it expects to hear from more consumers. The local man is apparently out \$8,000. He wired the money to Canada.

The letter being sent to consumers states they have 7 days to finish the two assignments. One assignment includes evaluating a wiring service (Western Union or Money Gram). The consumer is told to take the check they were sent, keep a portion of it and wire the rest of the money back to them. The check is fake and the consumer is out the money.

The letter has a phone number included, which is located in Quebec. When Nasief called, she got a voicemail with her company's name on it. The scammers called her back and when she told them who she was, they hung up on her.

Apparently, the scam artists are focusing on consumers who have posted resumes on job search sites. They are using the address on the job seeker's resume to send out the letters.

Measure Consumer Perspectives is a BBB Accredited Business based out of Louisville, KY. Nasief says, "My company does not send checks to engage consumers in mystery shopping. Any mystery shopping offer that involves the wiring of money is a scam." Her company is working with the BBB, Mystery Shopper Providers Association, the Federal Trade Commission, and the FBI to get the matter resolved.

If you have fallen victim to this scam, the BBB suggests you contact your local FBI office. The BBB will accept complaints related to this scam, but they cannot be formally processed. BBB will forward them to the FBI for their information and possible law enforcement action.

Mystery shopping is a valuable tool used by some of the largest retailers, restaurants, and banks to understand and enhance the experience they provide to customers. Unfortunately, thieves are using this type of business to scam consumers on a daily basis.

Mystery shopping is not a quick and easy way to make a large sum of money and receive "freebies." The Mystery Shopping Providers Association (MSPA) has developed the following tips for those interested in becoming a mystery shopper:


Prospective shoppers do not have to pay a fee to become a mystery shopper. Shoppers should be extremely wary of any mystery shopping offer that requests a fee.

Visit the MSPA Web site ([www.mysteryshop.org/shoppers](http://www.mysteryshop.org/shoppers)) for a list of reputable mystery shopping companies and opportunities. Contact the companies directly, not the MSPA, for more information on how to become a shopper.

Be patient. It takes time, sometimes months or even longer, to be contacted with an offer to conduct a shopping assignment.

Be cautious of opportunities that offer large sums of money for simple tasks like cashing a check or wiring money. A typical mystery shopping evaluation will earn about \$8 to \$20. If an assignment sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

## BOOK GROUP PROGRAM

The library's adult book discussion group will meet on April 6; at 9:30 a.m; at the library to discuss "Loving Frank" by Nancy Horan. The group, active for more than six years, usually meets the first Monday of each month (note exceptions below). Sometimes, the group takes a field trip relating to a book or may watch a movie interpretation of a selection. Every attempt is made to get copies of the books through interlibrary loan. Books may also be found in paperback at local bookstores including The Toadstool Bookshop. Occasionally, because of availability, dates of books to be discussed may be switched or substitutions made. Participants take turns researching information about the authors and bringing light refreshments to share. There are usually between eight and twelve attendees. Anyone is welcome to join in one or more discussion.

Library Director Karen MacDonald purchases a copy of each selection for the library collection. Any title may be borrowed by a library patron, though a book that's to be discussed will be reserved for book group participants the month of the discussion.

## Meeting Minutes Friends of the Daland Memorial Library February 23, 2008

Friends of the Daland Memorial Library Meeting Minutes February 23, 2009

In attendance: Hilary Sonner, Shirley Levesque, Heather Carver, Joan Brogioli, Bruce Schmidt, Amy White, Michelle Kolb, JoAnn Kitchel, Sally Hogan

Meeting opened at 7:35 p.m.; President Hilary Sonner presiding

Minutes of January 26, 2009 meeting accepted as published in the February 2009 newsletter.

### Correspondence

- A. Note received from Stephanie Apple requesting the newsletter continue to be in written form and sent out to members (as opposed to being sent electronically). Hilary noted the Friends had already voted to keep things as they are.

### Treasurer's Report - Joan Brogioli

- A. Accounts as follows: checking: \$551.74; ING account: \$3133.14; Fidelity account: \$12,486.09 (as of 12.31.08); Total: \$16,170.97
- B. Both the federal and state treasurer's reports have been filed and accepted.

### Librarian's & Children's Program Director's Reports - Amy White

- A. One story time program completed, the next one to begin in March; the next Laptime program to begin in May.
- B. Amy finishing up application to the NH Charitable Foundation for a \$2300 grant to help fund the children's summer reading program. The application is due in March with a reply expected in six weeks. ¼ to 1/3 of the applications are accepted.
- C. Anyone having a key to the library is asked to call the library to let them know the number so the whereabouts of all keys may be confirmed.

- D. Anyone interested in running for library trustee is asked to let Karen know so word may be circulated. Responsibilities include a once a month meeting and overseeing the daily operation of the library and the staff. (Andrea Galligher is not running again.)
- E. Anyone interested in heading up the new library building committee is asked to let Karen know.
- F. The meeting with the selectmen was positive. They are supporting the idea of the town purchasing the library and using it for town use. (The town already owns the land the library sits on.) There is an active committee that is looking at structural issues at the McCollom building and the intent is for this committee's responsibilities be expanded to look at all the public buildings in town and consider repairs and their uses. If the library becomes town owned, it would be a part of this study. Consideration of the town buying the library will not be brought up at this year's town meeting.

- G. Children's Summer Reading program - Amy working on logistics of some ideas. There will be a fort in the library. Steve Blunt will be performing at the MVVS the afternoon of June 5.

- H. Barn Dance - Probably to be held towards end of August. Amy to talk to Recreation Commission members about a date.

- I. Earphones are available for \$1 for the new "Playaway" tapes.

### Membership

- A. Another reminder that dues for 2009 are past due.

### Newsletter

- A. Copy to Stephanie Lindsey by Friday, February 27.

### Old Business

- A. Robert Rowe talk to be co-sponsored by the Friends and the Mont Vernon Historical Society. The talk will be held in the meeting room at the Town Hall on Thursday, April 9; at 7:30 p.m. (The MVCC is not available as they are hosting area churches' Maundy Thursday services this year.) The Friends will take care of goodies like cookies, bars, etc. and publicity and the MVHS will take care of drinks, cups and napkins. The talk will focus on NH during the time of the American Revolution.

Baker volunteers: Shirley Levesque, Hilary Sonner, Amy White, Joan Brogioli, Heather Carver - assignments at next meeting.

- B. New library logo is being fine tuned
- C. Murder Mystery Dinner - date set for Saturday, April 18; at a private home in town. There will be a charge of \$15 for single tickets and \$25 for couples. The play is "The Class Reunion of 1985." There will be as many as 80 parts. Anyone interested in helping may contact Hilary Sonner at 654-6341. Areas of help will include setting up, food and decorating. Those interested in a part may sign up and pay at the library the first week in April. (NOTE - those interested in working, but not having a part, will not be expected to pay for a ticket.)
- D. Spring Gala - Saturday, May 16th. The theme this year is "Aloha."

BOOKS - donations accepted at the library beginning May 1. Sorting once again will be at Amy White's home. In discussion of what to do with books after the sale, it appears "Boomers Books" in Weare may be closing. (The owner has come down to the library the last couple of years and taken what was left.) Bruce mentioned there is a service where book value may be checked on line using the ISBN number that's tied in with an organization that may

come and collect leftover books. What to do with remaining books after the sale to be taken up again at a future meeting.

PLANTS - Heather Carver and Sally Hogan will be requesting plants as we get closer to Spring Gala. If an older member in the community needs help digging that will be taken care of, otherwise, Friends of the Library and Mont Vernon Garden Club members and the community at large will be asked to dig from their own gardens for the sale. All donations, from one to ten to more pots of plants, will be most welcome. Those wanting pots may pick them up from Heather. Shirley Levesque offered to help the day of the sale. Bruce Schmidt offered to pick up any large quantities in his truck. Reminder that the proceeds will be divided evenly between the Friends of the Library and the Mont Vernon Garden Club.

Amy working on two floats this year for the parade - a teen float and a children's entry.

## New Business

A. Painted Chair Fundraiser - As part of the celebration of the Daland Memorial Library's 100th anniversary this fundraiser has been suggested. (The library's doors were opened August 4, 1909.) Michelle Kolb and JoAnn Kitchel, representatives from the Mont Vernon Artisans Group, were present to discuss the idea of artisans painting child size chairs, stools or possibly benches with themes of children's books. The Friends would provide the chairs and the books. The chairs with the books would be auctioned off. There would be a minimum bid. The aim would be to have 10-12 chairs and as many as 20. The decorated chairs would hopefully be completed by the first week in August and displayed in the library as the summer reading program is winding down. Discussion of options on how to display the chairs included using large clamps that would be attached to some of the vertical beams between the windows. The winners would be announced at the Barn Dance to be held at the end of August. Michelle and JoAnn will


go back to their group to see who may be interested and if the artisans would like to share the proceeds. They will report back at the March 23 meeting.

- B. Friend members are asked to consider possible candidates for Friend of the Library Volunteer of the Year and bring names to the next meeting. The candidate would be announced before Spring Gala in May.
- C. Friend member Kathy Lewis brought a news article from the February 22, 2009 "The Sunday Telegraph" to the group's attention. There may be federal stimulus money available for library projects in rural areas - the money would probably be in the form of grants or low-interest loans. The article will be given to the new library building committee.
- D. Friends are asked to think of ways, other than the painted chair fundraiser, to mark the 100th year anniversary of the library. Ideas may be brought to the next meeting.

## Exchange

### Mrs. Peck's Scones

At the February discussion of Eve LaPlante's "Salem Witch Judge: The Life and Repentance of Samuel Sewall", Ginny Covert brought in the most delicious scones she had enjoyed at her bridge group. Margret Peck gave her the recipe and now here it is to share:

½ cup dried fruit (Ginny used dried cranberries and dried cherries)	½ tsp baking soda
2 cups flour	5 T butter
3 T sugar	8 oz carton sour cream
2 tsp baking powder	1 egg yolk
¼ tsp salt	1 slightly beaten egg white
	1 tsp sugar
	1/8 tsp cinnamon

Preheat oven to 425 degrees.

In a small bowl pour hot water over fruit and let stand for 5 minutes before draining.

Combine flour, 3 T sugar, baking powder, salt and baking soda. Cut in butter until it resembles coarse crumbs.

Stir in fruit.

Blend sour cream and egg yolk

Add all at once into crumb mix, stirring just until dough clings together.

On lightly floured surface, knead gently 10-12 strokes

Pat or roll dough into 9 inch circle about ½ inch thick.

Cut into triangles or with round cookie cutter.

Place on UNGREASED cookie sheet and brush with egg white.

Combine 1 tsp sugar and cinnamon and sprinkle scones

Bake for 15-18 minutes.

Cool on cookie sheet for 5 minutes.

Makes 8-10 scones.
