Hardcover and paperback fiction, non-fiction, biography, travel, cookbooks, self-help, coffee-table books, children's books, DVDs, audiobooks and much more will be available for purchase. Books will be \$2 hardcover, \$1 paperback and \$.25 for children's items.

Need a pot or two? Check behind the library.

Plant donations accepted now through the May 17th. Please leave behind the library by the picnic tables – they will be watered as needed. Plants look there best if they're potted seven to ten days before the sale. Please label with name, color of bloom, when it blooms, height, and if it likes sun, part sun or shade.

Plants that will be for sale include: cranesbill geranium, bee balm, lily-of-the-valley, lung-wort, evening primrose (yellow), small sunflower, sweet william, lambs' ear, lupine, bleeding heart, Montauk daisy, chrysanthemum (red & white, pink), feverfew, money plant, woodland poppy, peony, asters, foxglove, astilbe, snow drops, herbs, rhododendron, and rhubarb. . .to name a few! Many plants will be priced at \$5, five plants for \$20. Larger and unusual plants will be priced separately.

NOTE: The majority of the plants that will be for sale come from Mont Vernon gardens.

***Plant Sale Raffle***

A beautiful herb garden planter with sage, chives, oregano, and rosemary will be raffled as part of the plant sale. Closer to sale day, a picture of the planter may be seen on the bulletin board in the library's foyer and on the post office bulletin board. The planter will be on display with tickets available for purchase on the day of the Gala at the plant sale table. Tickets are 1 for \$1; or 6 for \$5.

## Junior Book Clubs

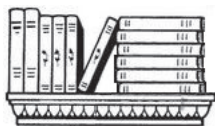
Thank you to all our junior book club members in grades 3-6 who joined us this year! We'll be back in September for a whole new year of books and fun! Keep reading!!

### ***June 3 - Book Discussion Program***

Next up on the Daland Memorial Library's book discussion program is a non-fiction selection: "The Big House: A Century in the Life of an American Summer Home" by George Howe Colt. Written in 2003, the author reflects on his family's 100 year history of the summer home built on Cape Cod by his great-grandfather. The four-story home with eleven bedrooms was the setting for weddings, divorces, anniversaries, love affairs, and deaths over five generations. The house, weathered, a bit run down, and a symbol of a disappearing way of life, is up for sale and the author's last summer visit.

The discussion will be held at the library on Monday, June 3, at 9:30 a.m. Copies of the book are available at the library.

The group usually meets once a month and the meetings last an hour and a half to two hours. Participants take turns bringing a light refreshment. No attendance requirement – attend discussions that are of interest. The library purchases a copy of each selection that may be checked out by library patrons when the book is not reserved for the discussion. Program suitable for adults.
